THE CHALLENGE: RECIDIVISM

1.6 million

people are currently in the U.S. corrections system, and almost all of them will eventually re-enter our communities.

95%

of inmates in state prisons will at some point be released back into the community.

THE SOLUTION: FOCUS ON RE-ENTRY

Data show that inmates who participate in...







...while in prison are **less likely** to return. And investments in reducing recidivism provide overall economic benefit.

Inmates who obtain GEDs while in prison are up to <u>30% less likely</u> to return to prison. (RAND Corporation) Inmates who complete addiction treatment in prison are <u>50% less likely</u> to return to prison. (California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation) Inmates who complete vocational training are <u>28% more likely</u> to find a job after release. (RAND Corporation)

Connecting **100** formerly incarcerated individuals with employment would produce <u>\$1.2 million</u> in annual earnings and <u>\$55 million</u> in post-release lifetime earnings for a city. (Economic League of Greater Philadelphia)

CoreCivic's Commitments

A focus on re-entry provides great benefits for our communities more people living healthy and productive lives and contributing to strong local economies. As an organization, CoreCivic is committed to focus more on re-entry in order to meet the changing needs of our government partners.

CoreCivic expects to graduate **more than 12,000** inmates with high school educations by the end of 2019. Over the next five years, CoreCivic will provide addiction treatment at no less than a 60% completion rate. **4,000 inmates** will complete CoreCivic's victim impact program over the next three years.

CoreCivic expects to award more than 25,000 industryrecognized certificates by the end of 2019. Over the next five years, CoreCivic will enroll between 1,900 and 2,300 inmates in faithbased residential programs and achieve a 95% completion rate for those who participate.
